Part III. Self Assessment of Entry

The "Road to Remembrance" Holocaust Essay and Trip provides a linkage between generations past and present, as well as between Brotherhood members and temple youth. Conceived by Irv Kempner as a tribute to General Eisenhower, who, at the end of World War II, challenged us as Jews and Americans to always bear witness to the Holocaust. High school students are given the opportunity to write an essay related to the Holocaust, and four winners are selected annually. Through our Yom Hashoah Yellow Candle fundraising and annual auction, the Brotherhood sends the contest winners on an all expenses paid trip to Washington, D.C. to visit the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum and the World War II Memorial. The winning essays are published in the temple bulletin, accompanied by pictures from the trip. The honorees are later recognized at a Brotherhood sponsored breakfast involving the congregation.

1. Assess program procedural completeness and achievement of program goals -

The program was designed to link temple youth both with Jewish history and with the Brotherhood. By requiring an essay to participate in the contest, learning takes place regardless of whether a student is selected as a winner or not. A committee including the rabbis and esteemed congregants chooses the winning essays. Those selected have an unforgettable experience in which they become active witnesses to the Shoah. This way, the Brotherhood passes on this crucial part of our legacy to the next generation, and they in turn educate the entire congregation through publication of their essays and experiences of the trip. Brotherhood members who accompany the students likewise have a moving time, which forges stronger bonds with our youth.

2. Explain presentation and documentation completeness –

"The Road to Remembrance" was conceived three years ago by Irv Kempner of the Brotherhood of Temple Israel. As a child of Holocaust survivors, he wanted to pay tribute to those who perished, as well as to live up to the charge of General Eisenhower, who admonished all to witness and "give first hand evidence" to counteract any future allegations that the Holocaust was "propaganda". Irv developed the proposal and has taken the lead in running the program each year. Attached is the Road to Remembrance Holocaust Essay Contest flier he created detailing both the trip and the requirements.

3. Achievements of program goals, publicity, marketing and advanced planning –

The primary goals involved carrying out our duty of "I'dor v'dor", teaching our children, fostering a tangible understanding of the Holocaust, increasing awareness in our congregation about the Shoah, the creation of Israel, and the stories of survivors who can be found in our own community. The annual event is publicized via email, direct mail, Shabbat announcements, and the temple bulletin. The marketing efforts have been bolstered by having former winners write about their experience of the trip in the temple bulletin. By honoring the winners at a Brotherhood breakfast, they also have a public opportunity to discuss their experience and they then serve as a model for upcoming high schoolers in encouraging participation.

4. Does the program enhance the image of the FJMC, region and/or your club –

As the FJMC has set an international priority of distributing memorial candles to punctuate Holocaust remembrance, we feel that this program enhances all elements of Brotherhood and FJMC. Within our club it has become a bellweather program that is an impetus for fundraising, Holocaust awareness, and creating an association between active learning and Brotherhood/FJMC membership.

5. Did you include information so other clubs can use this program –

The flier is self-explanatory in how such a program is set up, and individual clubs could tailor this to their own regional Holocaust museums or memorials. For example, the Simon Wiesenthal Center would be an ideal location for a Western club, or the Paper Clips Holocaust Memorial may be a perfect Southern destination.

6. What is its value in club building - number of named club members participating vs. club size and shul size-

Members of the Brotherhood feel that this program exemplifies honoring our dead, teaching to our children, and ensuring that "Zachor" carries new, personal meaning for a growing number of congregants.

This has been a program that has galvanized a number of Brotherhood and temple members. The direct number of participants is relatively small, roughly 8-10 people, but the impact on the entire congregation is quite large. If you include individuals involved with the Yellow Candle Program and Brotherhood Auction, both of which contribute to the fundraising effort, a majority of the Brotherhood is involved indirectly.

7. What is the effect on club administration - grooming of new officers for club, shul or region -

The Road to Remembrance has been viewed as a somewhat sacred task of the administration, and it has brought its founder, Irv Kempner, onto the Brotherhood Board of Directors. It has also helped the administration to see this as a seminal goal of our club, to foster Holocaust education and pass the information principally to our youth, and secondarily to our broader congregation. While not implemented to groom officers, it has taken our existing officers and provided them with a much greater sense of higher purpose and appreciation of involvement in the Brotherhood.

8. Identification of source of program or practice and description of unique aspects. Most programs were not invented out of the blue but evolved. Help us understand where it came from. –

The Road to Remembrance Holocaust Essay Contest is a fairly original local adaptation of the international March of the Living program, in which Irv Kempner has participated. March of the Living offers youths and adults the experience of traveling to Poland to view first hand the remnants of Jewish communities destroyed during the Holocaust, as well as visits to concentration camps. The trip ends in Israel to celebrate Yom Ha'atzmaut, providing a complete context within which to appreciate the founding of our Jewish homeland. Eventually, we hope to evolve our program to subsidize or fully cover the expenses of a student to attend the March of the Living.

9. Identification of this program as an adaptation of a previous Torch Award entry or other program. Awards will be given for implementations that are particularly effective. The original sources of the programs will be most pleased to know that their efforts have borne fruit. –

This program was developed out of the March of the Living program.
