This original Keruv program was created for our Beth El Community to learn and be surprised by the many similarities between the Jewish and Moslem traditions. We have a large growing Muslim community and our children are going to school and working with this population. Dating and intermarriage discussion need to begin now. To create this program we worked through multiple agencies to make contacts and prepare content.

The goal of this original program was to look at Keruv in a new light of adding the Muslim prospective and community to the Christian prospective and community that began the Keruv program. Christian Intermarriage has already created a major challenge for the Jewish community but the prospect of Muslim intermarriage is a scary thought to the Jewish community. Keruv programming provides a platform for bringing education, understanding and knowledge to our community.

The Hartford Seminary is one of the largest centers for Muslim and multi-cultural religious education in the USA. It attracts students from around the world. For the community the seminary brings in leading speakers to discuss the religious issues worldwide. I have been attending these seminars as part of my knowledge base for our temples Israeli Engagement committee. The Muslim community in Hartford is one of the fastest growing communities in Connecticut. It was this involvement that led to the concept of adding the Muslim prospective to our Keruv programming.

The Hartford Jewish Federation has a community outreach operation called JCRC. The JCRC created a monthly havurah of four Jewish and four Muslim couples that have been meeting monthly for the past two years. Each meeting discusses a topic to build on the understanding of each faith. Jewish leadership from this group suggested our first topic and than helped identify a Muslim representative Khamis Abu-Hasaballah, Ph.D. to share their customs. Rabbi Sowalsky from Beth El Temple covered the customs from the Jewish perspective.

The program had the following content.

Pregnancy/fetus/birth, and rituals after the birth during the 1st 30 days—comparing and also contrasting birth of men vs. women
Baby naming
Circumcision
Death—from health issues before passing, to how to deal with the body at passing
Honor for the dead, preparation and care of the body
Burial timing
Burial and cemetery rules

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Cremation, etc.

Morning customs

The survivors—the families---the different periods/customs of mourning through the initial death/week/30 days/year

The speakers took questions during their presentations and at the end. A measure of a program's success in how long the Q & A session goes on. We cut off questions 45 minutes after the program ended.

This program was designed to inform and educate our Beth El community, and our greater Hartford Community. It was promoted internally and externally to the community through flyers, email, mailed temple bulletin, press release of our flyer to the community.

The Beth El Men's Club raised our visibility in our Temple and Greater Hartford community by creating and bring cutting edge programming to our community.

To create this program we worked community wide working with the Hartford Jewish Federation, The JCRC havurah, The Hartford Seminary and the Beth El Temple clergy.

To duplicate this program the chair needs to identify a qualified Muslim representative in their community. If the above resources are not available in your community ask your Rabbi for assistance. The program was in the form of a Men's club breakfast and was very well attended.

Creating and running this program incorporated each of the focals of the FJMC.

Leadership: Beth El Temple Men's Club was the first to develop a New Keruv program focusing on the Muslim community.

Innovation: Finding the resources necessary to create the content for this program.

Community: Created a topic that brought our greater Hartford community to a stronger understanding of the differences and similarity of the Muslim and Jewish community. Reached out to the institutions in our community to create to contacts and content to make an impact in our community.
